

THE G. WAYNE CLOUGH GEORGIA TECH PROMISE PROGRAM is the first of its kind offered by a public university in Georgia. It provides the opportunity of earning a debt-free degree to qualifying students from low-income Georgia families. By picking up where other scholarships and financial aid options leave off, it fills a gap in the financial aid support system, covering 100% of a student's financial need.

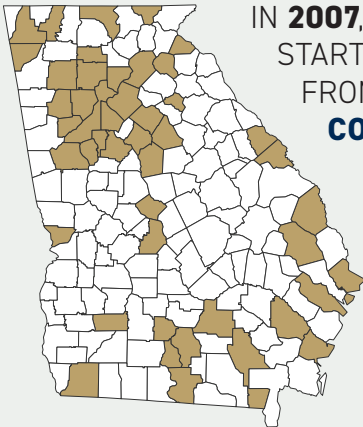

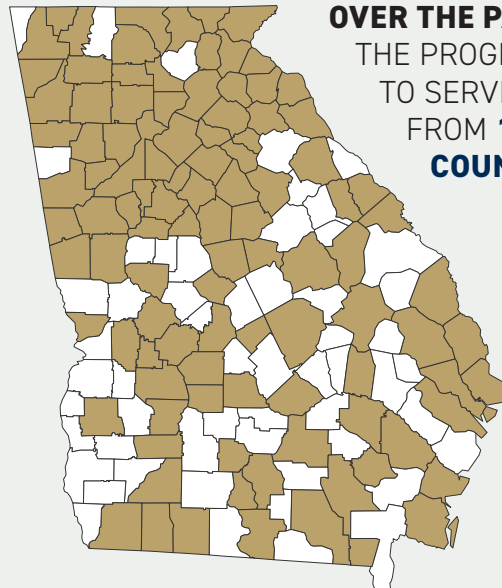
